Why vote?

Election Day is Tuesday, November 5, 2024. Most polls will open at 7:00 AM and close at 8:00 PM.

Why vote?

You can help make important changes in the way your town, state, and country are run.

Is my vote private?

Yes, your vote is private. No one will know how you vote unless you tell them.

Who can vote?

You can vote in Maine if you are:

- A citizen of the United States
- A resident of the State of Maine
- Age 18 or older

You must first register to vote. Read about how to register on the next page.

What will I be voting for?

On Tuesday, November 5, Maine voters will choose:



President of the United States



One U.S. Senator to represent Maine



U.S. Representatives in Congressional Districts 1 and 2 to represent Maine



Maine State Senators and Maine House of Representatives



Yes or No on statewide ballot questions



County, district, and municipal candidates and initiatives

Registering to Vote

How do I register to vote?

You can register to vote in Maine if you are:

- An 18-year old United States citizen residing in the town where you will vote.
- A 17-year old citizen who will turn 18 on or before Election Day.
- If you are 16, you can still fill out your voter registration card, and you will be eligible to vote when you turn 18.
- People convicted of a crime or in jail can still vote. If you are in jail, you register to vote in the town where you lived before going to jail and vote by absentee ballot (see absentee voting information on PAGE 10).
- People experiencing homelessness can still vote. If you are experiencing homelessness, you register to vote using the location where you sleep. This location could be a shelter, a friend's place, or outside and is considered your residence.

Whether you register in-person or by mail, you will need to provide proof of identity and proof of residence:

- Many kinds of photo ID will work, including student and tribal ID, state IDs, and U.S. passports.
- A piece of mail can show your address.
- If you have no address, you can still register in person in the town where you stay.
- If you are in a jail, your voting address is in the town you lived in before you went to jail.

Any day is a good day to register to vote in Maine! You can register to vote for the November 5 election one of these ways:



Online: You will need to submit your registration by October 15 so that your Town Clerk has time to process the application. Register to vote online:

By mail: You will need to submit your registration by October 15 so that your Town Clerk has time to process the application.



Third-Party: You will need to submit your registration at a voter registration drive by October 15 so that your Town Clerk has time to process the application.



BMV: You can register to vote and/or update your voter registration at your local Bureau of Motor Vehicles office. You will need to submit your registration by October 29 so that your Town Clerk has time to process the application.



Register to vote in-person at your city or town hall anytime, up to and including Election Day, November 5, 2024.



Register to vote at your voting place on Election Day, November 5, 2024.

Before Voting

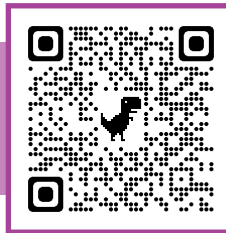
Where do I go to vote?

Some towns have multiple polling places. To find out where you vote, call your Town Clerk's office or visit the election page on your Town or City's website. You can also look up this information at this link: www.maine.gov/portal/government/edemocracy/voter_lookup.php

What time do I vote?

- Polling places open in the morning; opening time varies by town.
- All polling places close at 8:00 PM.
- If you are in line to vote at 8:00 PM, you will not be turned away and may vote.

Can I see the ballot before the election?

Yes, your town or city will have a sample ballot. Check their website.

What if my name is not on the list at my voting place?

- The people working at the voting place will help you.
- You may need to register to vote, and you can register at the polling place on Election Day. You must bring identification and something that shows a current address. A driver's license or state ID with the current address meets both criteria. Otherwise, bring a checkbook or bill

addressed to you at your current address, along with a social security card, birth certificate, or hunting/fishing license.

- If your problem is not solved, you can ask to vote a "challenged ballot." Your vote will count on Election Day, and in the meantime, your Town Clerk will help to resolve the issue.

Do I need an ID (identification card)?

No. Registered Maine voters do not need to show ID to vote. However, you should bring your ID and proof of your address (example is a driver's license and electric bill) if:

- You are a first-time voter.
- You have moved.
- You need to register to vote on Election Day.

Don't worry — no eligible voter can be turned away.

At the Polling Place

What will I do at the voting place?

- Look for signs or markings to tell you where you should go. Most polling locations will have a separate entrance and exit.
- Some polling places will sort people by last name. Go to the election clerk, and give your name and address. If you are registered to vote, your name will be on the list.
- The election clerk will hand you paper ballots you will use to mark your votes.
- You will go into a private voting booth and mark your ballots.
- When you are done, you will put the ballot into the ballot box or a machine.

What if I need help at the voting place?

Ask an election clerk for help if you have any questions. Election clerks can help you fill out a ballot and give you a new one if you need it.

How do I fill out the ballot?

1. Each ballot will explain how to fill in your choices for each section.
2. You will use Ranked Choice Voting for some candidate elections. You can rank as many candidates as you wish or rank only one.
3. You do not have to vote on every ballot. Only the parts you vote on will count.
4. Check your ballot before turning it in.
5. If you have made a mistake, you can ask for a new ballot.

You can get help from the following:

- A friend or a relative. Your helper does not have to be a voter. Your helper does not have to be old enough to vote.
- An election worker.
- Your employer or union official *cannot* help you vote.

YOUR VOTING RIGHTS

Your Ballot, Your Vote: Don't panic if you registered to vote but your name is not on the list. Get help from a poll worker to make sure your vote is counted. Remember, Maine has same day registration. You can still register on Election Day.

Challenged ballots: You must be allowed to vote a challenged ballot even if you don't have ID or proof of where you live. No one who is eligible to vote should be turned away.

I.D.? Not required: Registered voters are not required to show ID in order to vote in Maine. However, you do need to provide proof of identity in order to register to vote.

Made a mistake on your ballot? You have the right to ask for a new ballot.

Feeling lost? Ask for help: Poll workers are there to help you! They'll show you how to mark your ballot and give you a challenged ballot if you need one. If you're at the wrong polling place, they should tell you how to get to the right one.

Stay in line: If you're in line even when polls close at 8:00 PM, stay in line! You have the right to cast your ballot.

What is ExpressVote?

ExpressVote is for people who may have difficulty reading a ballot. It is a device that can be used to help you read or hear your ballot and fill it out. The election clerk can set it up for you.

How does ExpressVote work?

ExpressVote has a video display screen and built-in ballot printer. The ballot can be seen in large print. The ballot can be read to you through headphones that are provided.

How do I make my selections with ExpressVote?

You can make your selections by:

1. Touching the screen.
2. Using a keypad with different-shaped, colored buttons with braille labels.
3. Using a switch with a green Yes or a red No.
4. When you are done, the device prints a ballot marked with your choices.
5. You put your ballot into the ballot box or counting machine.

Ranked Choice Voting

What is Ranked Choice Voting?

Ranked Choice Voting lets voters rank the candidates in order of preference. You do not have to rank all the candidates. You may choose to only rank one candidate.

When will I use Ranked Choice Voting?

For the November 5 election, all Maine voters will use Ranked Choice Voting in the U.S. Presidential race, U.S. Senate race, and U.S. House race. The names of write-in candidates will not appear on your ballot, but if you know you want to vote for them, there will be space where you can write the candidate's name. Then, you can rank the candidates in the order of your preference.




Additionally, Portland and Westbrook voters will use Ranked Choice Voting for local office races, such as mayoral, city council, and school board races.

How does Ranked Choice Voting work?

- Voters rank candidates in the order of their preference: first choice, second choice, third choice, and so on.
- When all the ballots are counted, if one candidate gets more than 50% of the first choice votes, they win.
- If no candidate receives more than 50% of first choice votes, the candidate with fewest votes is considered defeated.
- Voters who ranked the defeated candidate as their first choice have their votes counted for their second choice.
- This is repeated until a candidate has received more than 50% of the vote.

Ranked candidates in order of preference

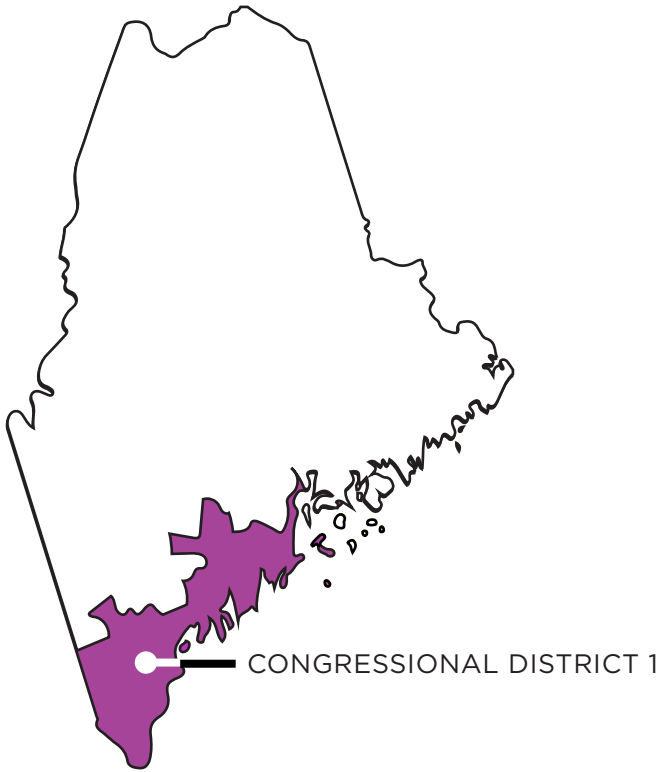
Why should I rank my vote?

- If your first choice is defeated, your ballot will still count for your next highest choice.
- You can't hurt your favorite candidate by also ranking the other candidates. Those choices only count if your first choice is defeated.
- You can't help your favorite candidate by ranking only one candidate. Your first choice will always count if your favorite candidate has not been defeated.

How do I avoid mistakes on my ballot?

- Mark only one oval per row.
- Mark only one oval per column.
- Rank as many candidates as you like.
- You do not need to rank any candidate that you do not support.
- If you make a mistake, ask the clerk for a new ballot.
- Ask for help. You will not be the only one with questions.

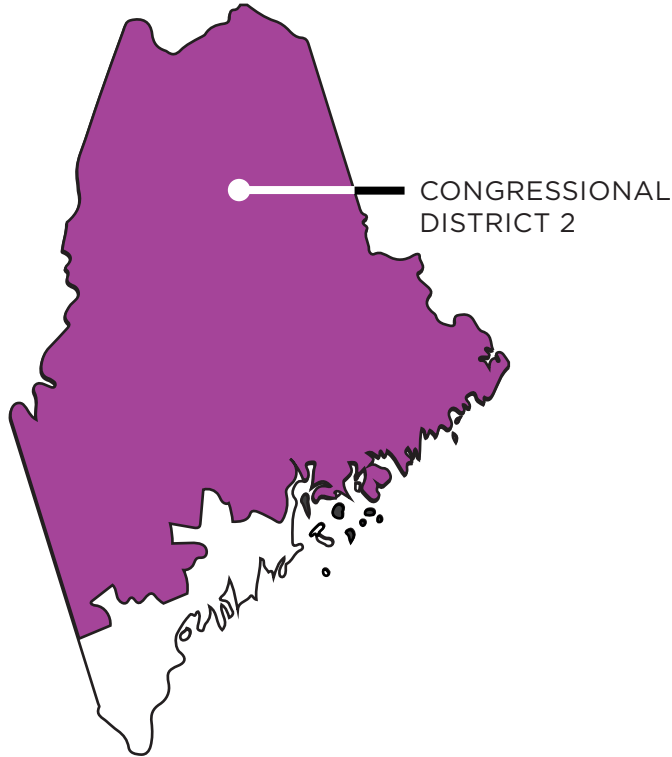

Absentee Ballots

What is absentee voting?

- If you want to vote early before Election Day, you can use an absentee ballot.
- Request your absentee ballot early if you plan to vote by mail. Ballots are mailed to voters 30 days before the election.
- You can also request and pick it up in person at your Town Clerk's office.
- Absentee ballots can be requested by any registered voter until Thursday, October 31. After October 31, you can still request an absentee ballot by providing a valid excuse.

How do I get an absentee ballot?

Any registered voter can request an absentee ballot by Thursday, October 31. Request your absentee ballot using one of these methods:



By phone



In person at your Town Office



By mail. You will need to print, fill out, and mail this application:

**Be aware that waiting until the October 31 deadline may not allow enough time for your ballot to reach you through the mail or to return your ballot by mail.*

A member of your immediate family may request a ballot for you. Call your town clerk for more information.

Accessible Ballots

Voters can request an absentee paper ballot to vote via mail, or for voters with print disabilities (such as vision impairment or blindness, physical dexterity limitations, learning disabilities or cognitive impairment), you can request an electronic accessible ballot that will be sent to your email address.

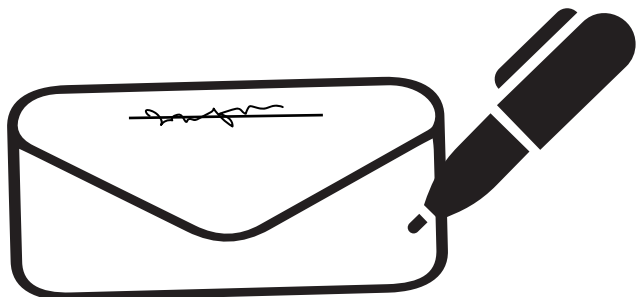
Ongoing Absentee Voting

If you are 65+ years old and/or live with a disability, you qualify to apply for ongoing absentee voter status. This means you can apply to have an absentee ballot sent to you automatically for each election cycle. You only have to apply once! Contact your Town Clerk to sign up for this service.

Absentee Ballots

What do I do with my absentee ballot?

1. Fill out the ballot.
2. Put it in the special envelope and sign the envelope.



Be careful! Many people forget to sign the outer envelope.

3. Return your ballot to your town clerk's office by 8:00 PM on Election Day.
 - You can return your ballot by mail; be sure to mail it at least one week ahead of Election Day in case of delays.
 - You or an immediate family member can drop off your ballot in-person when your town office is open.
 - Many towns and cities will have secure dropboxes outside the town office, which will be accessible even when the office is closed.
 - Someone who is not in your family may return your ballot for you, but you will need two witnesses to sign the envelope.

How do I request an absentee ballot after Thursday, October 31?

To get an absentee ballot after the Thursday before the election, call or go in person to your city hall or town office and complete a special application.

Your application must include one of the following reasons:

- You will be out of town unexpectedly all day on Election Day.
- You have a disability.
- You live on an island and are unable to get to the voting place on Election Day.
- You have an illness and cannot leave home or a treatment facility.

Your Town Clerk must receive your absentee ballot by 8:00 PM on Election Day, November 5 in order for it to be counted.

Ranked Choice Voting

Maine voters will use Ranked Choice Voting to rank their preferred presidential candidates in the general election on Tuesday, November 5.

You do not have to rank all the candidates if you are certain of your top choice. See PAGE 7 for how to use Ranked Choice Voting. See PAGES 8-9 for a sample ballot.

The President is the Chief Executive of the U.S. government and the Commander-in-Chief of all the military forces. As Chief Executive, the President: enforces laws, treaties, and court rulings, develops federal policies, prepares the national budget, and appoints federal officials.

The President also approves or vetoes acts of Congress and grants pardons. As Commander-in-Chief, the President has the authority to send troops into combat. The Constitution and federal law describe the powers of the President.

The election of President of the United States is an indirect election. The popular vote chooses delegates or electors to the Electoral College, which elects the President. The Electoral College has 538 electors. States have an elector for each member of Congress. States have two electors for their two Senators and one for each member of the House of Representatives (based on the state's population.) Maine has four electors.

The President must be at least 35 years old, a natural-born citizen of the United States, and have lived in the United States at least 14 years.

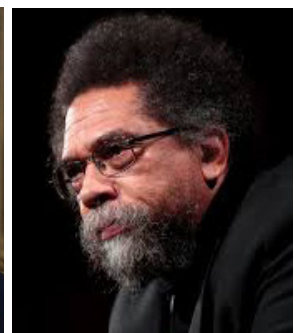

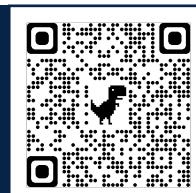

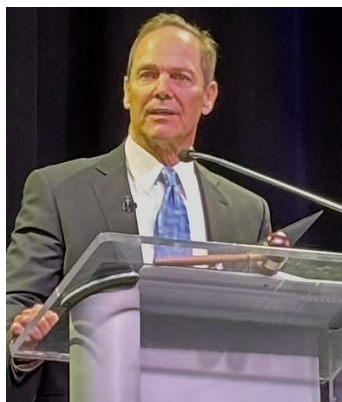
Senators write and pass laws. They share this job with the House of Representatives. They research issues of national importance and hold public hearings. The Senate approves treaties with other countries. They also approve cabinet members, federal judges, and foreign ambassadors who are chosen by the president.

Citizens of each state elect two Senators who represent the whole state. They serve for 6 years. Voters can elect a Senator for as many terms as they choose. The Senate consists of 100 members, two from each state. Every two years, one-third of the Senate is elected. Senators must be at least 30 years of age, a citizen of the United States for at least nine years, and a resident of the state the senator represents at time of election.

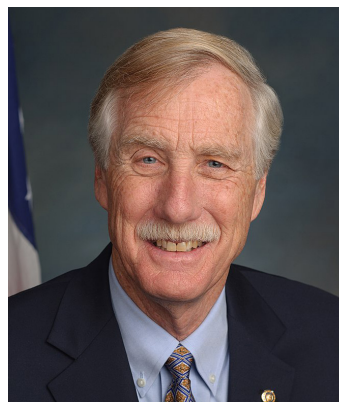

What are the most important challenges we’re facing, and how do you propose to address them?

Basic living costs, such as retirement, appear to be on the mind of many working-class people. As a parent and someone who cares about the rising costs of living, I am concerned about Senator King’s proposal to raise the age of Social Security eligibility to 70 years old. He has not adequately addressed problems on his proposal. This concern is voiced in conjunction with the rise in elderly homelessness and the inability of younger generations to afford housing and education while being told they need to find spare income to save for retirement. If senior citizens are struggling on Social Security benefits now, how does raising the eligibility age alleviate the trends for rising poverty?

What policies will you propose during your term, and how will you get those policies passed into law?

In Maine, our largest trading partner is Canada, which has the ability to supply us with a greater renewable energy resources and boasts significant statistics for clean energy programs. Adequate energy is crucial to the development and sustainment of an economy. If elected, I would work closely with our northern partners to expand the market growth of renewable energy while minimizing the impact on Maine’s environment and ensuring fair benefits are received by Mainers.

The second major proposal would be focused on the fair taxation of assets and wealth in the nation. As seen from many sources, both political parties have wealthy supporters who appear to be unwilling to contribute to the nation’s welfare.

What are the most important challenges we're facing, and how do you propose to address them?

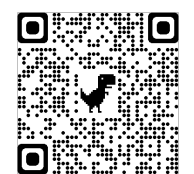

What policies will you propose during your term, and how will you get those policies passed into law?

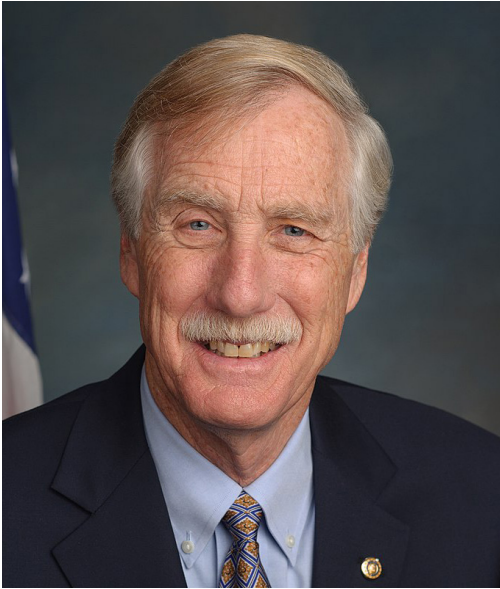

I would also propose legislation to establish more proportional representation in the U.S. House of Representatives (i.e., multi-winner districts with RCV) and restructure the Senate so that the allocation of political power is more in-line with a state's population. I would work to advance these reforms to end gridlock in Congress so that universal pre-k, gun safety, women's reproductive rights, social security benefit increases, and other important policy measures are enacted.

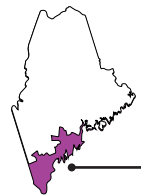

Maine voters will use Ranked Choice Voting to rank their preferred U.S. House candidates in the general election on Tuesday, November 8.

You do not have to rank all the candidates if you are certain of your top choice. See PAGE 7 for how to use Ranked Choice Voting. See PAGES 8-9 for a sample ballot.

Members of the House of Representatives write and pass the nation’s laws. They share this job with Senators. They research issues of national importance and hold public hearings. Bills that raise money for any government program start in the House and must also be passed by the Senate.

The United States is divided into 435 Congressional districts. The districts are based on the number of people in the state. Every state has at least one Member of the House of Representatives. Maine has two. All Members of the House are elected in even-numbered years. Voters can elect a Representative for as many terms as they choose. U.S. Representatives must be at least 25 years of age, a citizen of the United States for at least seven years, and inhabitants of the state in which they serve.

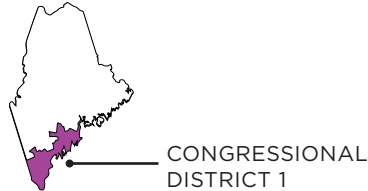

What policies will you propose during your term, and how will you get those policies passed into law?

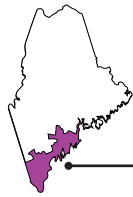

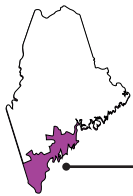

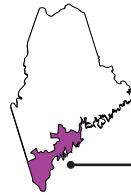

Ballot Question Guide

On November 5, Mainers will vote on five statewide ballot questions.

THE TYPE OF BALLOT QUESTIONS:

Question 1 is a Citizen's Initiative. These reach the ballot through a process of signature collection. When enough Maine voters sign the petition, the question goes on the ballot for a statewide vote.

Questions 2-4 are Bond Issues. Bonds allow the state to finance long term public projects that seek to improve infrastructure and create jobs. Bonds are first passed by the Maine Legislature and then placed on the ballot for a statewide vote.

Question 5 was a bill that was passed by the Maine Legislature and then sent to the ballot so that Mainers could approve of the new flag.

QUESTION ONE:

On your ballot, the question will read: *An Act to Limit Contributions to Political Action Committees That Make Independent Expenditures.* Do you want to set a \$5,000 limit for giving to political action committees that spend money independently to support or defeat candidates for office?

What it's asking: This question asks if you want to set a contribution limit of \$5,000 to Political Action Committees, or PACs, that make independent expenditures, also known as Super PACs. Anyone can make an independent expenditure for or against a candidate. That includes individuals, groups, corporations, labor organizations, and political committees. Independent expenditures are not contributions and are not subject to limits. What does an independent expenditure look like? As an

example, a Super PAC could spend money on an independently produced ad that promotes their preferred candidate — or attacks their opponent.

PROS: Groups are quick to fund Super PACs because there are currently no limits and because the names of big donors are not disclosed. This means that groups can feed large amounts of money into independent expenditures, like robust television campaigns that attack a political opponent. Some may see Super PACs as a form of corruption and think they should have limits like regular PACs.

CONS: Super PACs may be seen as a form of expression protected under the First Amendment. Advocates who want to keep Super PACs will argue that imposing limits would be unconstitutional.

A YES vote means you want to set a contribution limit of \$5,000 to Political Action Committees. A NO vote means you do not want a contribution limit.

QUESTION TWO:

On your ballot, the question will read: *An Act to Authorize a General Fund Bond Issue for Research and Development and Commercialization.* Do you favor a bond issue of \$25,000,000 to provide funds, to be awarded through a competitive process and to leverage matching private and federal funds on at least a one-to-one basis, for research and development and commercialization for Maine-based public and private institutions in support of technological innovation in the targeted sectors of life sciences and biomedical technology, environmental and renewable energy technology, information technology, advanced technologies for forestry and agriculture, aquaculture and marine technology, composites and advanced materials and precision manufacturing?

What it's asking: The state of Maine has a science and technology plan that seeks to compare our infrastructure to other states, note where there are gaps, and make recommendations for improvements. This question asks if you want

to designate funds to the Maine Technology Institute, which will use the funds to offer grants and loans to businesses and organizations, both public and private, that are working towards fulfilling Maine's science and technology plan.

PROS: Question two came from a bill, LD 416, brought forward in the Maine Legislature. The bill was sponsored by both Democrats and Republicans. Groups believe that this bond will increase research and development opportunities, grow Maine's economy, and establish the state as a biotech hub.

CONS: Some may be uncomfortable that the state will send millions of dollars to public and private sectors. Some others may be opposed to state borrowing in general.

A YES vote means you approve of the \$25,000,000 bond to the Maine Technology Institute. A NO vote means you do not approve of the bond.

QUESTION THREE:

On your ballot, the question will read: *An Act to Authorize a General Fund Bond Issue to Restore Historic Community Buildings. Do you favor a \$10,000,000 bond issue to restore historic buildings owned by governmental and nonprofit organizations, with funds being issued contingent on a 25% local match requirement from either private or nonprofit sources?*

What it's asking: This question asks if you want to approve of a \$10,000,000 bond to be issued to the Maine Historic Preservation Commission. The Commission will deliver funds as grants to government and nonprofit organizations that apply to restore the historic buildings in their communities.

PROS: Question 3 came from a bill, LD 912, brought forward in the Maine Legislature. It was sponsored by both a Democrat and a Republican. Government and nonprofit groups support the bill and advocate for more funding to save and restore special, historic buildings in their communities.

CONS: Some may oppose the state spending money on historic buildings instead of building new ones. Some others may be opposed to state borrowing in general.

A YES vote means you approve of the \$10,000,000 bond to restore historic buildings. A NO vote means you do not approve of the bond.

QUESTION FOUR:

On your ballot, the question will read: *An Act to Authorize a General Fund Bond Issue to Promote the Design, Development and Maintenance of Trails for Outdoor Recreation and Active Transportation. Do you favor a \$30,000,000 bond issue to invest in the design, development and maintenance for nonmotorized, motorized and multi-use trails statewide, to be matched by at least \$3,000,000 in private and public contributions?*

What it's asking: Do you want the state of Maine to invest in and maintain statewide trails? If approved by voters, the Maine Trails Program will be developed over several years. Some trails will be nonmotorized (used for hiking and biking), some will be designated for ATVs and other motorized vehicles, while half will be multi-use trails. The bond will also help repair damage caused by erosion, severe storms, and climate change.

PROS: Question four came from a bill, LD 1156, brought forward in the Maine Legislature. It was sponsored by both Democrats and Republicans. Advocates believe that this will expand and improve Maine's outdoor recreation economy.

CONS: Some may oppose the state spending money on recreational trails because it does not offer a return investment, and that the state's current trail system is sufficient. Some others may be opposed to state borrowing in general.

A YES vote means you approve of the \$30,000,000 bond to create a statewide system of trails to be known as the Maine Trails Program. A NO vote means you do not approve of the bond.

QUESTION FIVE:

On your ballot, the question will read: *An Act to Restore the Former State of Maine Flag*. Do you favor making the former state flag, replaced as the official flag of the State in 1909 and commonly known as the Pine Tree Flag, the official flag of the State?

What it's asking: Do you want to keep the current blue coat of arms Maine flag that features a farmer and seaman (pictured left)? Or do you want to replace the flag with a design similar to the 1909 Pine Tree Flag that features a blue star and pine tree on a light tan background (also pictured left)? It's common for states to update and modernize their flags to better represent that state's culture.

PROS: The Pine Tree Flag was once the state's official flag but was replaced in 1909. The Pine Tree Flag has become a staple symbol in Maine's tourism industry. It's a common and popular flag used to sell souvenirs and decor items. People may prefer the simple look of the flag and the iconic pine tree and star.

CONS: Others may prefer the Maine Coat of Arms on the blue background that has been used for 115 years. People like that the flag features a farmer and a seaman, along with a north star that represents Maine's powerful motto: dirigo, or "I Lead." Others will also argue that, if the flag changes, the state will have to spend additional money to buy new flags that hang at government buildings.

A YES vote means you want to change Maine's state flag to the Pine Tree Flag. A NO vote means you do not want to change Maine's flag.
